Sermon Notes

The two books of I and II Samuel were originally one book written in Hebrew. There are three principal characters in the two books: Samuel, Saul and David. The story of Samuel is confined to I Samuel, and is also the story of Saul, except for the report of his death found at the beginning of II Samuel.

There are two main literary strands of thought interwoven in I Samuel; they are usually referred to as the Early Source and the Late Source. The late source, with which the book begins, is basically an interpretation of the life of Samuel, beginning with his birth and ending with his death in chapter 25. The leading ideas were (1) that Samuel was the judge and true ruler of Israel under God; (2) that the choosing of a king was a mistake; (3) that the personal failure of a figure like Saul was punishment for their sins; (4) that David, inspite of his being king, was a man who merited God's favor. This source was compiled in the latter days of the monarchy (750-650 BC).

The Early Source, most of which probably was written by a single individual during the reign of Solomon, is of such good historical and literary quality that its author deserves the title, "the father of history", a title usually given to the Greek historian Herodotus, who lived 500 years later.

In the Early Source, the establishment of the Kingship is regarded as a divinely ordained blessing and the salvation of the nation. Samuel is a less important figure, a modest prophet, not a ruler in his own right. Saul is a noble but tragic figure. David is the real hero, but a very human hero, the latter being in no way disguised by the author.

The tragedy of Saul is appropriate for our Lenten journey because we see a man with great potential, but flawed by his character. He is a mirror that can allow us to see ourselves.
